s a high school committed to helping students prepare for college and beyond, excellent academics is a priority. Quality course design, combined with passionate teaching, is paramount. The BCHS faculty strives to know its students' strengths and needs in order to deliver quality, customized instruction. Curriculum is designed with an emphasis on developing students' critical thinking skills – an integral part of the SAT. Concentrated SAT preparation and regular intervention sessions

prepare students for success on the SAT as well as Advanced Placement exams. Increased SAT and ACT scores and astounding AP pass rates are the result of the teamwork of BCHS faculty, parents and leadership. The rigor of the academic program, however, does not compromise BCHS' focus on Christian spiritual growth. Instruction from Christian teachers and mentors, who are also experts in their respective subject matter, enables faith and learning to be meaningfully integrated.


On a timetable coinciding with the development of the new 1600-point SAT, BCHS began implementation of intentional SAT preparation focused on building the same skills and knowledge the SAT was redesigned to test. While BCHS launched its SAT prep sessions and curriculum integration in 2016-17, several additional layers to these existing programs, plus revisions to intervention, were instituted during the 2017-18 school year.

Students received weekly/biweekly exposure to SAT-style questions in all English, math,

history, science and Bible classes. This focus not

only provided familiarity to SAT questions, but also built critical thinking – a desired outcome defined by the College Board and universities alike.

The English department designed a daily curriculum model incorporating the SAT standards. The model has been implemented within the core humanities courses at the start of the 2018-19 school year.

# **Revamped intervention expands learning benefits**

In its second year of implementation, the Response to Intervention (RTI) model continued to be a focal point of the BCHS educational experience, as it utilized PSAT score analysis to identify areas where students needed additional academic support. This analysis allowed faculty to help students approach important benchmarks in the four English and three math subscores assessed on the PSAT. While reduced course failure rates were again achieved (as defined by a BCHS strategic goal), skill mastery was the objective of this revamped RTI program. Target intervention not only makes it easier to track students' progress over time, but also provides actionable feedback with a goal toward college and career readiness.

The RTI program has again been reformatted for the 2018-19 school year, but this time to align with the new eight-period schedule (see page 7). Ongoing adjustments to the RTI program assure that students of all academic ability levels are receiving an outstanding and personalized educational product.

# Expert advises students on college admission essays

Ethan Sawyer, a nationally recognized college essay expert based in Los Angeles, spoke to the junior class and Honors Academy students to inspire and instruct them through tips and an interactive workshop on how to write their college application essays. He also led a roundtable discussion, giving additional training to BCHS administration and the English department faculty on how to guide students through the college essay process.

# AP exam scores significantly outperform state, national averages

In addition to continuing the expansion of Advanced Placement course offerings, BCHS initiated new student-driven policies and faculty training in 2017-18 that led to astounding success in both the AP classes and on the AP exams. In English, BCHS' pass rate topped those in California and the U.S. by more than 40 percent. In math and social sciences, the AP

state and national averages by approximately 20 percent. While individual AP courses have experienced consistent success in previous years, the changes instituted to the AP program led to the strongest results in the school's history with an overall AP pass rate of 74 percent.


With the pre-existing criteria a student needs to take an AP course intact, BCHS instituted an option for students to decide,

along with their teacher, if they should take the AP exam or a class final. While 93 percent of AP students elected to take the corresponding AP exam, this freedom allowed students to make the decision that most closely aligned with their individual academic goals.

BCHS made strategic moves in the hiring of new teachers who helped with AP success, as well as intensified the training and accountability of all its AP teachers. Additionally, on a biennial basis, AP teachers continue to attend the National AP Conference so they

# New 8th period increases schedule flexibility, expands student opportunity

To complement the rigor of honors and AP courses, BCHS has established unique electives throughout the years which both inspire and train students in areas of interest. However, with only seven class periods available, the core requirements of English, history, math, science and Bible, as well as the additional graduation requirements, have historically limited the number of electives a student was able to incorporate into their schedule.

Beginning in the 2018-19 school year, BCHS has added an eighth period to its school day. In conjunction with their college counselor, students determine their workload with options to further challenge themselves by doubling up in one of the core areas or by taking an extra elective in a subject area they find intriguing. These opportunities contribute toward a wider scope of electives, while producing more students to populate such classes each year.

The eight-period day has provided immediate benefits. By offering a greater number of courses, class sizes have decreased. Numerous new courses have been offered. The fine arts program has seen a surge in enrollment. Students who, in previous years, were taking a full load of seven classes, have the opportunity to continue taking seven classes, but now to add a study hall. In short, students have greater options - they can choose to ramp up their core academic load, add a relatively non-stressful elective course or take a study hall. Such student choice has already positively impacted campus life. This eighth period class addition will not only afford students greater scheduling flexibility, but it will ensure the continuance of small class sizes as the school grows.

BCHS launched its Honors Academy with an inaugural class of 36 freshmen and sophomores in 2017-18. These students gained a deeper understanding of leadership by attending the Global Leadership Summit and by hearing the speakers who came to campus as part of the lecture series. Topics addressed by these prestigious leaders in our community included quantum computing, business in both the medical field and homebuilding, as well as leadership in Christian ministry.

In addition to receiving additional preparation for the PSAT and the SAT, Honors Academy students met regularly and engaged in debates, watched surgical videos, read books and wrote corresponding compositions, participated in a national college tour (see next page), and developed their higher order thinking skills through a variety of other experiences.

With a goal of developing the whole student, the Honors Academy ventured to Segerstrom Center for the Arts in Costa Mesa and watched a performance of "The King and I." In December 2018, the Honors Academy, along with others in the BCHS family, will see the Broadway sensation "Wicked" at the Hollywood Pantages.

# Annual national tour expands students' views of potential colleges

California is known for its amazing schools, four of which are consistently ranked in the top 25 universities in the nation. Yet much is to be gained through the exploration of opportunities from institutions outside of the state. BCHS administration places a strong value on organizing an annual college tour that enables students to experience distinct campuses in different parts of the country.

In January, 24 BCHS Honors Academy freshmen and sophomores, accompanied by parents, college counselors and school administrators, embarked on a college tour to the southeastern section of the U.S. While students in the Honors Academy are strongly encouraged to participate in the college tour each year, the opportunity has now been extended to all BCHS students.

# **FORENSICS**

Under the direction of Forensics teacher and coach Jillian Stump, the speech and debate program celebrated many successes at tournaments throughout the year.

After securing an early pregualification and competing at the Valley level, Gaines and Stump earned a spot to compete in the California High School Speech Association State Speech and Debate Championship. The pair placed in the top 50 Public Forum teams in California.

# **NATIONAL HISTORY DAY**

Madeline Abernathy made her third appearance in the National History Day competition last June at the University of Maryland. One of 90 competitors in her Individual Performance category, Abernathy finished as co-champ at the state competition level after advancing from the Kern County competition. Abernathy conducted research utilizing primary and secondary sources, then wrote a 500-word essay with an annotated bibliography before performing her piece titled "The Vietnam Veterans Memorial - a story of Conflict and Compromise" for the panel of judges at each of the three levels of competition.



# **ROBOTICS**

The BCHS robotics program continued building momentum last year, and will further develop as it transitions from an after school club to an actual elective course. Under the leadership of BCHS faculty member Rachel Belden, BCHS hosted the third league match of the Kern Robotics League on Nov. 18, 2017. BCHS had four teams in this league alongside 42 other area teams who compete in VEX Robotics, a worldwide robotics competition group.

In the 2017-18 school year, FFA demonstrated the most successful showing at the Kern County fair in the club's history, and reached significant milestones in student leadership.



# STUDENTS GROW CLOSER TO GOD THROUGH CHAPEL, SERVICE IN THE COMMUNITY



See You at the Pole National Day of Prayer

The most cherished time on BCHS' campus is that which is set aside for chapel. The weekly worship is impactful for students and faculty alike.

The sole venue on campus able to hold more than 500 students and faculty is the gymnasium. Wanting to create an environment that distinguishes chapel from the multitude of other events held in the gym, Spiritual Formation Director Joe Cabalka added a black backdrop to segment the space. He modified the seating by adding chairs on the floor and reducing the span of bleachers to establish a more intimate setting. Students chose their own seats in lieu of sitting with a specific class period, which mirrored the "freedom with accountability" structure of BCHS' approach to student life.

"The change in last year's chapels of allowing students to sit in chairs on the floor made me feel closer to God during worship," recent graduate Lauryn Reeves said. "It allowed me to truly focus on chapel rather than the hustle and bustle of the rest of the day." Another benefit was the addition of the Worship Arts course, from which the worship team was formed. Meeting daily in a dedicated class period, versus the previous once each week, was a huge benefit. This benefit extended to the overall preparedness of the team and allowed them to more effectively lead the BCHS community in worship.

The students in the Worship Arts course were also able to learn more about what takes place behind the scenes to get ready for a weekly worship set from teacher Bob Hudson, who also serves his local church as a worship director. In addition to the musicians on stage, students ran the sound, lights and presentation software. In class, the team spent time reading and discussing a Christian book challenging the new wave of young worship leaders to not only think beyond the pragmatic, but also about theology. Hudson's desire is to prepare the students' hearts and minds, not only for leading worship, but for godliness.

"The heart of the worship leader is so important. I believe that is more important than their musical abilities," Hudson said.

Growing in the Christian faith walk extended beyond chapel. The worship team had opportunities to lead at other community events, including one at The Mission at Kern County. Additionally, BCHS sent its sports teams to serve together at the Mission throughout the year. These are the types of experiences BCHS is working to expand. Through solidifying additional partnerships with other local nonprofit organizations, BCHS students will begin more regular community service in classes this year.

Last October, BCHS launched a new program where seniors could be paired with a local elementary or middle school student to mentor them. In its first year, 10 seniors were accepted into the program and served as mentors, sacrificing their extended lunch or early release period once a week to invest in one of these young students. Cabalka said he expects this program to grow this year and enable BCHS seniors to grow in their own faith through being mentors.

"It was an eye-opening experience for me," said Reeves, who was one of these senior mentors. "By spending time with a middle school student who came from a broken home, I was able to truly see not only how blessed I have been growing up, but also how easily an individual could share the love of God right in his or her own neighborhood."

While there is a concentration on spiritual growth integrated into the classroom, sports and clubs, BCHS also intentionally designs programs to help students grow spiritually. Through corporate worship, prayer, biblical application, missions and service – to name a few – students are offered unique opportunities during their formative high school years to demonstrate and share their faith while also becoming grounded in it.

"I want our students to know the love of Jesus," Cabalka said. "I want them to know that they are free in Him and be able to celebrate that."

# School's vision, student's passion collide

Crowds of BCHS fans fill the stands to support the Eagles. However, not everyone can show their school spirit by attending games and other campus events. With this in mind, BCHS began livestreaming select games last year through its broadcasting class.

The class has traditionally centered around producing a news program for school announcements. For nearly a decade, this has afforded students interested in a broadcasting or journalism career some hands-on experience. With the addition of the opportunity to broadcast live from athletic events, new opportunities opened for students to enhance their learning outside of class. One of the first students to seize the opportunity was Knight Jarecki.

Jarecki's father, Stosh Jarecki, worked in the news and television

industry as a video editor, including doing camera work for the Los Angeles Rams in the 1980s. Stosh Jarecki advised BCHS with the technology needed to enable the livestream. He has also advised his son on how to improve his play-by-play announcing.

Knight Jarecki says he spends roughly three to four hours each week in preparation outside of class for his live broadcast opportunities.

Since the first livestreamed football game in September 2018, the BCHS YouTube channel, which hosts the live videos, nearly tripled its subscribers. While fans can follow the action live, each game is also archived for viewing later.

"Not a lot of high school students get to do this. I'm very fortunate," Knight Jarecki says. He says that his live broadcasting experience really piqued the interest of some of his prospective colleges. He also broadened his knowledge base by attending two summer programs – Gen Storytellers at the University of Oregon, where he took sports journalism and public speaking, and a Penn State program where he took a broadcast journalism class.

Due to scheduling, the actual livestream must take place outside of class time. However, Broadcasting teacher Bob Hudson is expanding the course curriculum to focus on sports broadcasting in addition to news broadcasting. BCHS also plans to expand the livestreamed content.

The skills needed to be a successful broadcaster require

students to have strong public speaking and improvisation skills. They also need to know how to set up the equipment and work the camera. With sports, being able to track stats is also an important step for creating meaningful viewing experiences. BCHS offers courses to further develop student growth in each of these areas.

"I'm taking journalism this year, and I'm excited to become a better writer, which will help with telling stories better. That, in turn, will help me become a better broadcaster," Knight Jarecki says. "Journalism stretches so far in all the ways the field is expanding. #### In what ways has BCHS met your expectations?







# FINANCE AND OPERATIONS

BCHS operated with a strong financial structure in the 2017-18 fiscal year. Evidence of this strong fiscal structure included the following metrics:

- an operating budget surplus
- elimination of all building debt
- approximately \$1 million of fundraising/development
- tuition increase holding at 3 percent annually
- a growing Plant (Facility) Fund
- completion of ongoing campus additions/improvements
- the funding of a generous tuition assistance program
- a healthy annual audit

A major planning goal for the 2018-19 fiscal year is an increase in awareness of and giving to the BCHS Endowment Fund. Meeting this goal of growing the Endowment Fund will allow for an even more secure financial future and a diminishing need to rely upon annual fundraising needs.
