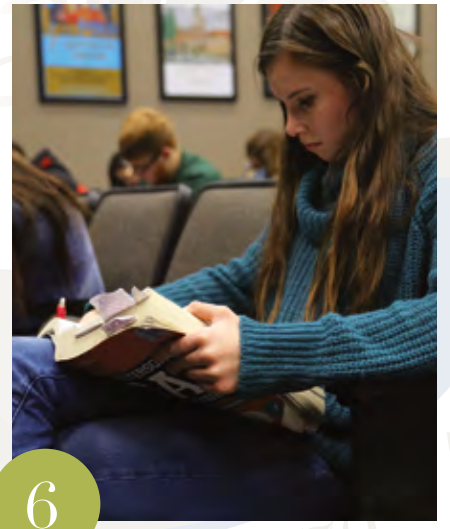

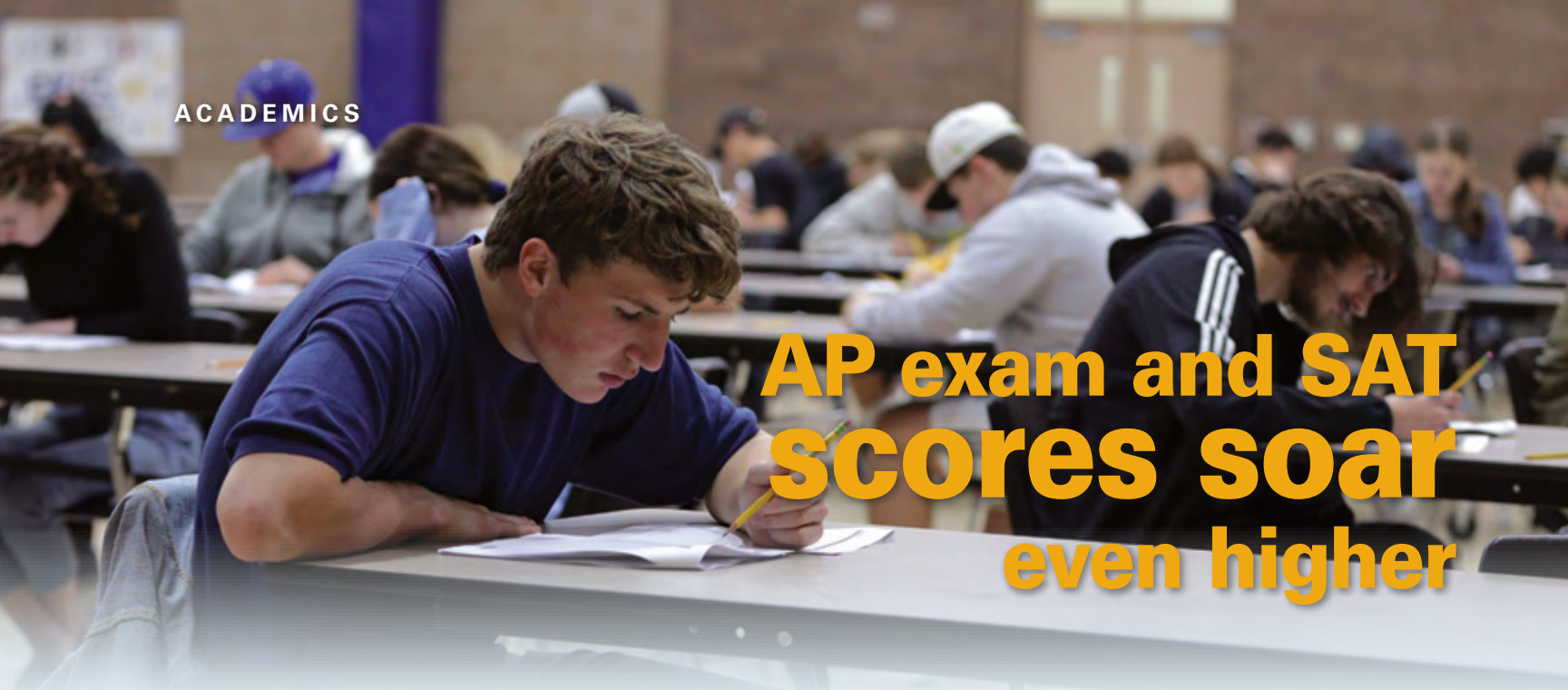

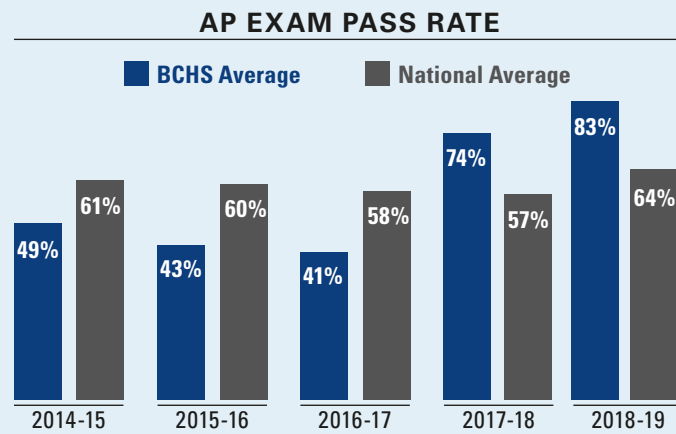
AP exam and SAT scores soar even higher

Our focus on educational program excellence is unwavering. It is documented in our strategic plan and intertwined with our commitment to focus on Christ. Although both focuses are visible in all aspects of our campus ministry, we celebrate the astounding academic achievements of our students during the 2018-19 school year.

Advanced Placement Exam

Students garner many benefits from taking AP classes and exams. One notable benefit is the fact that 85% of selective colleges and universities report a student's AP experience has a favorable impact on admissions decisions. Another benefit occurs when students pass their AP exams; they earn college course credits, thereby reducing the cost of their tuition.

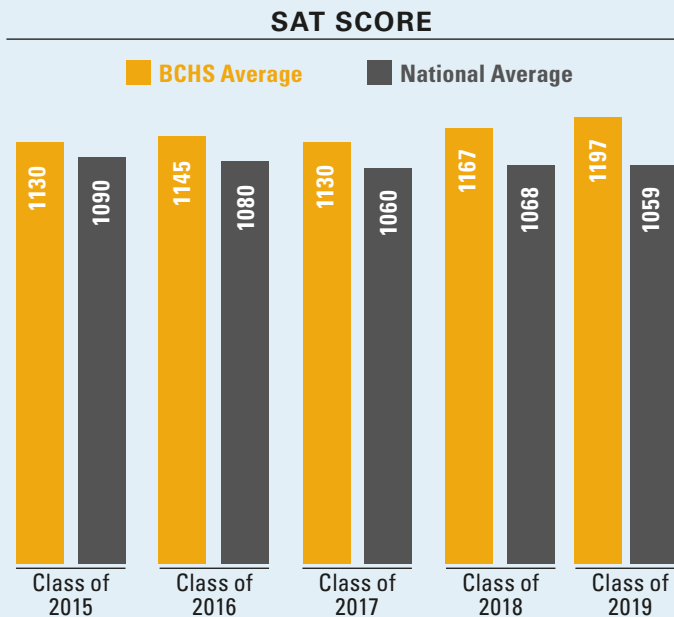
In 2017-18, our students' AP exam scores outperformed national averages significantly. Remarkably, our students performed even better in 2018-19 with an AP pass rate of 83%. Out of 257 AP exams taken, there were 53 high scores of 5.

SAT

Two years after BCHS implemented an enhanced SAT preparation program, our students' scores are at an all-time high. The BCHS Class of 2019 averaged 1197 on the SAT. That score is an increase of 30 points over 2018 and 129 points higher than the national average. For comparison purposes, a score of 1197 places a student in the top 25 percentile of the nation.

TEACHER SPOTLIGHT

Mr. Steven Chai

2019 BCHS Teacher of the Year

Mr. Chai graduated from UCLA in 2004 wanting to be a lawyer, but God showed Mr. Chai the way to impact the world for Him was not as a powerful attorney. It was through the church. To that end, Mr. Chai began working at a private Christian school and discovered he loved working with young people. This led him to help start up a school in North Little Rock, Arkansas. When Mr. Chai and his wife Shannon became pregnant, they decided they wanted to raise their family where she grew up, so they moved to Bakersfield.



In 2017, BCHS hired Mr. Chai to teach U.S. History and Government at BCHS. We asked him a few questions about life and his passion for teaching.

Impact: What was family life like for you growing up?

Mr. Chai: My parents immigrated from South Korea in 1977. I was born in Pasadena, California, where family life revolved around Koreatown and going to church. Both of my parents passed away when I was young, and because I grew up as a teenager without a father, I have a heart for discipling young men. I feel like youth ministry and education are my mission and my calling.

Impact: Talk a little about teaching at BCHS.

Mr. Chai: One of the things I like to say is that Christian education can change the world. Not education, but Christian education. Think about the impact of six hours of Biblically rooted, intense, gospel-minded direction. Think of what that can do in the hearts and minds of young people.

For a long time, I thought the Lord would powerfully use me as a lawyer going into ministry. But He showed me He wasn't impressed by my high status or stature. God says, "kings are nothing to Me." The fact that He chose me to teach here at BCHS... I just want a humble heart to say yes to that.

Impact: How do you take your students to the next level?

Mr. Chai: I love teaching seniors, but watching the transformation juniors make is astonishing. They literally go from being underclassmen to seniors in one year. Juniors get broken and then they grow in maturity by leaps and bounds. It's so fun to watch them grow up!

It's nothing I do. It's because of all their hard work that I get

to enjoy seeing their transformation. I just sit in the back seat while they drive. Kudos to all those here teaching juniors. We work in concert to see them go from "I know everything" to "I know nothing and am ready to hear and be pushed and to think in different ways." A lot of that is about treating them with the maturity they deserve.

Mr. Chai's student survey comments

One thing that I appreciate about this course is...

How it forces us to be a little uncomfortable and to confront our beliefs and why we believe them.

How enthusiastic Chai is for our success, both in regards to the class and to our lives as a whole. He is always available for help.

Mr. Chai has a clear enthusiasm for not only government and politics, but also for God and student success. He pushes students to achieve and succeed to their upmost ability, and truly brings out the best of the student.

How much Mr. Chai cares for his students and his love for the material. We talk about problems going on in the current news which is very engaging. He pushes students to do their best and ALWAYS has a positive attitude for class.

College choices: wisdom in meeting the family's goals, needs and dreams

Stating that BCHS is a college preparatory high school should come as no surprise. It is our expectation, with few exceptions, for students who graduate from BCHS to continue their education and ultimately earn at least a collegiate bachelor's degree. Such an educational outlook simply is one of the expected outcomes of having attended our Christian high school. The graduates from the Class of 2019 have met the first step of this expectation wonderfully, with 98% of its students enrolling in college. What's more, they far surpassed the academic standards as compared to the vast majority of graduating classes across the United States.

Notably, 20% of our graduates earned greater than a 1400 on the SAT. As a class, students averaged 1197 on the SAT, almost 140 points higher than the national average. The AP pass rate was an incredible 83% as compared to 64% for the nation. Four students were named a part of the National Merit Scholarship Program. The list of academic accomplishments could go on. In summary, these students' efforts have set a new bar for educational excellence at BCHS while earning access to a great variety of colleges.

It has been interesting to watch the collegiate choices of the Class of 2019. The statistics as we now know them are fascinating.

- Approximately 25% of our graduates are attending what widely would be considered "top 100 academic schools in the country" as measured by various indices and considering either the school's overall academic reputation or a specific major in which our graduates are enrolled.
- Approximately 20% of our graduates are attending overt Christian universities and continuing their pursuit of an education in which the Good News of Christ and academics are intertwined.
- Almost 30% of our graduates are attending community colleges.

What is the takeaway from these pieces of data? First and foremost, these numbers clearly show that BCHS is the conduit by which teenagers can meet their collegiate dreams. The Christian education they are receiving on Stockdale Highway provides the springboard for their college aspirations. Students desiring to challenge their minds against the best in our country and world are being accepted into elite academic universities where acceptance rates are extremely low. Students desiring to go to private Christian schools are not only being admitted into these schools, but are also attaining significant levels of academic scholarships to assist in making attendance a financial reality. Finally, many graduates are choosing to attend a local community college. A brief note on such a community college choice.

The role of community college continues to evolve in American society. At a time when the traditional four-year out-of-town college experience is pricing itself out of practicality for many families, community colleges are providing an increasingly viable alternative. Families are calculating community college to be the best economic route for the start of a collegiate education. It's a strategic decision based on finances, not academic ability.



Every now and again, I'll hear a comment about the colleges and universities BCHS is "pushing" or the actual educational institutions our graduates are attending. For every person who feels we push the elite academic institutions too much, there's another who feels we don't push such an option enough. Likewise, it is not unusual to hear similar statements related to Christian colleges, out-of-state schools and the community college option. Yet, as I look at the choices from this past year's graduates, I am proud of the decisions our students and families have made.

I have seen choices for a continuing education path based upon many factors that reflect wisdom for meeting the family's specific goals, needs and dreams. I rejoice with our families and students and am confident that BCHS has played an important role in the decisions which have been made. We are equipping students for academic success and, even more important, with Christian discernment as they embark upon life beyond BCHS.





Annual college tours visit top campuses around the country

Each year, a significant percentage of our graduates attend colleges that are outside California. The reasons for attending an out-of-state school vary from family to family, but we want to accommodate their desire. We do so by organizing annual college tours to visit select campuses around the country.

In 2017, BCHS students, parents, college counselors and administrators visited four schools on the east coast. We visited four colleges in Texas in 2018. For 2019, we have planned visits to schools in the upper Midwest, and we plan to tour campuses in the Northwest in 2020.

BCHS student places 9th in the nation

Madeline Abernathy, class of 2019, traveled to Washington D.C. for her fourth consecutive National History Day competition. The theme for the year was Triumph and Tragedy, and Madeline's 10-minute performance was on the space shuttle Challenger disaster. Her piece was titled, *The Challenger – A Tragedy That In Time Led To Triumph*, in which she portrayed teacher Barbara Morgan, who was backup to Christa McAuliffe and flew in the shuttle as an astronaut years later. Madeline also portrayed a physicist who made headlines after investigating the reasons for the explosion. Madeline's performance earned ninth place in the nation!

"Although I performed many times at state and national contests," Madeline recalled, "the real pleasure I have is performing locally before service clubs and schools. Recently, I performed my Vietnam War Memorial piece in front of Vietnam vets. Afterwards, half a dozen veterans came up to me with tears in their eyes, thankful that someone my age called attention to how they were treated. That was an inspiration to me."

Madeline won the California History Day championships to qualify for the annual national competitions. In addition to building character, these high-level competitions taught Madeline some useful life skills.

"I learned how to conduct research in depth from primary sources. I know how to use archives and 'bird-dog' to dig deeper into the subject to get the information that's buried somewhere!"

BCHS 3-5 YEAR STRATEGIC PLAN

BCHS engages in strategic planning. The Board of Directors, which includes several school parents, and the school's Executive Leadership Team conduct this activity with feedback obtained through the annual school survey process. Crucial to our success, strategic planning clarifies our vision, priorities, direction and decision making.

Strategic planning is ongoing. Topics covered or not covered within a strategic plan might be added or subtracted as "conditions on the ground" change. Yet, we recognize that a strategic planning document is completed at a specific point in time. What follows is an abbreviated version of BCHS' 3-5 year strategic plan, adopted by the BCHS Board of Directors in 2018.

SECTION 1: OVERARCHING ASSERTIONS

Focus on Christ and Educational Program Excellence – An Intertwining

We must never take for granted the heart and soul of our school, that which is central to our mission: "To honor God as we help students soar!" **Honoring God through the Christian spiritual commitment on our campus must be unmistakable and permeate all aspects of our ministry.** This includes student and faculty/staff member relationships. Our commitment to Christ-centeredness on campus cannot be haphazard but, instead, must be intentional and constant, upheld as the very core of BCHS' ministry.

A drive for academic excellence must be present. We deliver academic excellence within a college preparatory environment. We challenge students appropriately and prepare them for their collegiate years. The academic program is designed to be rigorous without being elitist. We want to meet all students at their ability level upon entering BCHS and push them for maximum academic growth. **BCHS finds its niche in Kern County through the unmistakable intertwining and unalterable commitment to these two fundamentals: the focus on Christ and educational program excellence.**

Strategic Planning

Effective Staffing

Any organization is only as effective as its people. BCHS has marshalled significant efforts and resources to provide competitive compensation for our faculty and staff. **The strategic goal is to attract and retain the highest performing individuals possible for every position of employment.** We must make every effort to identify and retain Christian faculty, staff and administrators who are “at the top of their game” in their respective fields.

Programmatic Planning

An ongoing focus on programs, in conjunction with an emphasis on enrollment, must be kept at the forefront as we consider BCHS’ short-term and long-term attractiveness and stability. Ongoing dialogue about the academic and extracurricular offerings at BCHS must occur on an annual basis.

Facility Planning

Likewise, an ongoing focus on facilities, in conjunction with an emphasis on enrollment, must be kept at the forefront as we consider BCHS’ short-term and long-term attractiveness and stability. Our facilities currently can accommodate a student body of approximately 650-700 students. Facility planning and purposing must be completed in conjunction with programmatic planning. **Providing space for necessary programming (present and future) is vital to enrollment growth.**

Fiscal Vision

Fiscal solvency and long-term fiscal health are critical to BCHS’ sustainability. Financial debt no longer weighs upon the school’s balance sheet. **Even so, fiscal goals must be in place that best support the points identified in the previous paragraphs.** The absence of such goals would inevitably lead to operating budget “creep.” Funds would be spent unnecessarily on individual pet projects, and the lack of a coordinated plan would endanger short-term and long-term sustainability.

Additionally, we must continue to expand our donor base and overall donor giving. This includes increasing alumni participation as well as **developing our endowment fund.**

How are we doing?

Generating top quality academic results is a high priority at BCHS. Results don't lie. They provide objective testimonials as to the question, 'How are we doing?' Survey results are one method of gathering data in an attempt to answer this question. On an annual basis, BCHS gathers student and parent feedback using such surveys. These results are carefully analyzed, and what we have found is highly encouraging.

When asked to provide a score on a 100-point scale as to overall satisfaction with BCHS, students' average score was 88.8 and parents gave BCHS a 90.5 score. These results have been rising over the past five years. Another

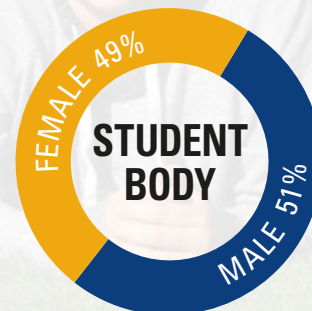

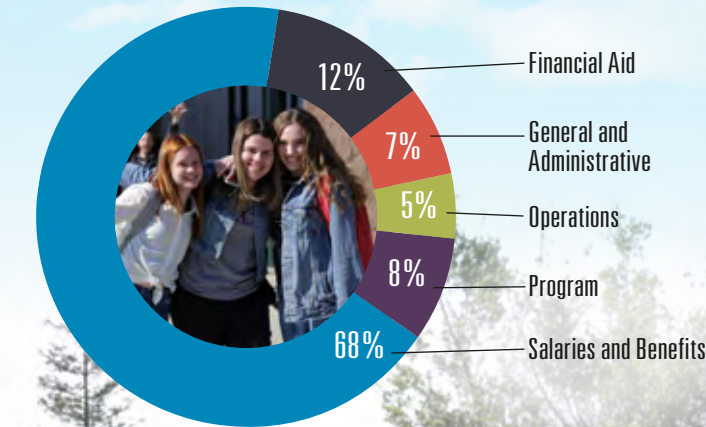
